I. TITLE OF COURSE: AR1103- Interior Design I

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: 3 credit hours

3 hours of lecture and 0 hours of lab per week.

Interior Design I is a course that will help students develop an appreciation of the principles of art as applied to interior design. Exterior and interior styles, the art principles and elements of design, color schemes, arrangement of home furnishings, selection of floor, textile, window and wall treatments, and dealing with lighting, accessories, and storage will be covered. For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected. Pre-requisite: None
