I. TITLE OF COURSE: BH1112- TRIO Enrichment

# II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Two credit hours One credit hours of lecture and One credit hours of lab per week.

This supplemental course is for TRiO participants only and one of the credit hours is tution-free. It is designed to expand the basic components of the First Year Seminar course such as, time management, teamwork, study skills, leadership and career planning. In addition, professional tutors will instruct students in all subject areas. Special emphasis is given in career exploration for the undecided student utilizing StrengthsQuest. Financial literacy will also be a key component; providing the student with an understanding of financial management both as a student and as a productive citizen. Students will be provided information on how to successfully transfer to a four-year institution upon graduation. The value of being a TRiO participant and the services available to them will be emphasized.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

- 9. Students will articulate a personal definition for advising.
- 10. Students will begin an active participation within an SSS Cohort group.

- 2. In addition, student communication skills will be evaluated through the use of their StrengthsQuest action plan and classroom assessment techniques.
- 3. Student will be required to complete handouts and return for further assessment in understanding of their readings and discussion boards.

#### Outcome 3:

- 1. This outcome will be measured by classroom discussion, the StrengthsQuest action plan, and discussion boards that are designed to stimulate students to engage in factual, insightful, rational, and evaluative analysis.
- 2. Classroom assessment techniques will also be used to measure this outcome.
- 3. Student will be required to complete handouts and return for further assessment in understanding of their readings and discussion boards.

#### Outcome 4:

1. This outcome will be measured by student completing required assignments which will include handouts.
