II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Three credit hours

Three credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

This course provides the student with new, innovative and effective techniques for obtaining information and detection of deception.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

Pre-requisite: CJ1403 Criminal Investigation or instructor permission
