SEWARD COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE COURSE SYLLABUS

I. TITLE OF COURSE: CJ1201- Firearms Safety and Marksmanship

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: One credit hours

40 minutes credit hours of lecture and One credit hours of lab per week.

This course is a firearms course for students wanting to learn the safe handling of their handgun and to practice marksmanship skills. The course will provide training in gun safety rules for field stripping and cleaning the weapon and proper shooting techniques.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

Pre-requisite: Instructor permission

III. PROGRAM AND/OR DEPARTMENT MISSION STATEMENT:

VI. COURSE OUTCOMES:

At the completion of this course students should be able to apply the basic principles of handgun use, including firearm safety and marksmanship fundamentals. The students will demonstrate their understanding of the subject by demonstrating at least 75% competency of the topics to be covered, including:

- 1. Identify specific parts of the weapon needed for range and classroom activities.
- 2. Function the semi-auto.
- 3. Field strip the weapon.
- 4. Clean the weapon.
- 5. Handle the weapon in a safe manner.
- 6. Demonstrate proper loading and unloading of the weapon.
- 7. Clear stoppages and malfunctions
- 8. Demonstrate to the instructor: Proper stance, Breathing, Grip, Site Alignment, Site Picture, Trigger Control, Follow-through, Un-holstering and re-holstering, Shot placement and Safe

VII. COURSE OUTLINE:

The classroom time will cover the following materials:

- 1. Introduction to the Glock 19 semi-auto pistol.
- 2. Functional characteristics.
- 3. Preventive maintenance and maintenance of the semi-auto
- 4. Safe handling of the weapon in a non-shooting environment and at the range.
- 5. Loading and unloading of the weapon.
- 6. Stoppage/malfunction of the semi-auto
- 7. Proper stance, grip, sight alignment/sight picture and trigger control.

The range time will be held at the Seward County Firing Range located on east 8th street in Liberal. Directions will be given in class. While at the range, we will review the following:

- 1. Range commands and safety
- Shooting positions
 Drawing and holstering
- 4. Firing of the weapon
- 5. Malfunction and stoppage drills with live ammo

VIII. INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

- 1. Lecture/Demonstration
- 2. Films
- 3. Live fire

IX. INSTRUCTIONAL AND RESOURCE MATERIALS:

- 1. Classroom and Range
- 2. Equipment and supplies

X. METHODS OF ASSESSMENT:

Methods of assessing SCCC and course outcomes include class attendance, participation, student demonstrations, and written examination of fundamental safety rules and liability as dictated by Kansas Law and the U.S. Supreme Court, and safe handling and firing of the weapon.
