I. TITLE OF COURSE: CJ1403- Criminal Investigations

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Three credit hours Three credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

This course explores issues including the effective interview and interrogation techniques, crime scene management and lab processes, crime scene documentation methods, case preparation and court presentation.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

Pre-requisite: CJ1203 Introduction to Criminal Justice OR CJ1503 Introduction to Law Enforcement
