Three credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

This course is an in depth study of advanced methods of investigation of crimes; scientific aids available to law enforcement officers, including forensic chemistry, physics, and micro analysis. Investigative procedures from crime scenes through laboratory analysis to court presentations.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.
