I. TITLE OF COURSE: CJ2903- Problems in the CJ System I

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Three credit hours

Three credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

Repeatable for a maximum of six hours. This course is a study of a specific problem in a specialized area in the Criminal Justice System. Emphasis to be placed on practical experience with criminal justice principles, practices, and administrative methods required for effective results in contemporary society.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

Pre-requisite: EG1103 English Composition I or CJ1183 Report Writing and permission of the instructor

- 7. Utilize the library and internet to research information.
- 8. Identify sources of information.
- 9. Write a quality research paper pertaining to modern day criminal justice problems.
- 10. Stimulate and develop an open mind to change.

VII. COURSE OUTLINE:

- 1. Week one: Discuss area of interest with instructor.
- 2. Student is to meet weekly with instructor and discuss progress.
- 3. Midterm: Student should have a bibliography and outline of paper to present to instructor.
- 4. Finished paper is due finals week.
