I. TITLE OF COURSE: ED1112- Introduction to Education - Field Experience

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Two credit hours Zero credit hours of lecture and Two hours internship credit hours of lab per week.

This course is intended primarily to give prospective teachers the opportunity to consider seriously their suitability for a career in education. Must enroll in ED1103 Introduction to Education concurrently.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

Outcome 3:

1. The students will reflect upon their field experience opportunities to create an oral presentation to the class, sharing their insights of the classroom and what factual and insightful analysis they gathered from their observations of experienced and effective teachers.

Outcome 5:

1. The student's critical thinking outcome will be measured by requiring them to make a critical analysis of the field experiences that they participate in and/or observe. This engages the student in factual, insightful, rational, and evaluative analysis concerning their field experience.
