I. TITLE OF COURSE: EG0622- English Composition I Plus

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Two credit hours

Two credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

This course is a co-requisite of EG1103 for those students assessed at a level below college-level English. This course emphasizes active learning, improved reasoning skills, engaged reading, and effective editing skills with special attention given to grammar to maximize the likelihood of success in EG1103. Additionally, this course emphasizes writing thesis statements and organizing essays. This course will not count for graduation.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

Pre-requisite: Refer to Placement Matrix. Instructor permission is required to enroll.
