II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Three credit hours Three credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

This course is an extension of English Composition I and emphasizes critical thinking, analytic and persuasive writing, and research methods.

1. Students will write two-three essays/assignments demonstrating the skills of rhetorical analysis, argumentation, and summary/paraphrase.

2. Students will write an 1,800-2,500 word argumentative essay based on research and documented according to Modern Language Association style.

3. Students will write an in-class final examination essay demonstrating their ability to argue a position and analyze sources effectively.

X. METHODS OF ASSESSMENT:

Outcome 1:

1. Competency 1 will be assessed by requiring students to read selections from the textbook, and magazine, newspaper, and internet resources concerning their research project. Students' ability to read and comprehend these assignments will be measured by classroom discussion and essays.

Outcome 2 & 5:

1. Student essays will measure SCCC Competencies 2 and 5, as assignments require students to apply what they have read to the arguments they write, arrange the argument logically, support their assertions, and anticipate the needs and attitudes of readers.

Outcome 6:

1. Information Literacy will be assessed using the SCCC Information Literacy rubric to evaluate the Annotated Bibliography assignment, required as part of the Research Project.
