I. TITLE OF COURSE: EG2103 - Creative Writing

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Three credit hours Three credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

Students will explore the genres of short fiction, poetry, and creative non-fiction and will compose and revise works in the genre(s) of their choice. The course serves students of varying interests and abilities through the workshop peer-evaluation approach.

VII. COURSE OUTLINE:

1. Students will read and analyze models of published writing and will write both short exercises and complete works in response to textbook assignments, lectures, and discussion covering the three genres (poetry, fiction, nonfiction) the course emphasizes.

2. Following the first manuscript submission deadline, students will prepare for workshop discussion by reading the assigned student writing. Quizzes, required weekly written critiques, and additional exercises will supplement the workshop activities.

3. Following the second manuscript submission deadline, students will prepare for workshop discussion by reading the assigned student writing. Quizzes, required written critiques, and additional exercises will supplement the workshop activities.

4. Final Assignment: Portfolio and reflection essay
