I. TITLE OF COURSE: EG2303- English Literature I

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Three credit hours Three credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

Major authors and literary developments are studied in this chronological survey of English literature from the Anglo-Saxon period through the Augustan Age.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.

Pre-requisite: English Composition I Placement

VI. COURSE OUTCOMES:

VII. COURSE OUTLINE:

The course will consist of a chronological study of major authors and literary developments in English literature from the Anglo-Saxon period through the Augustan Age.

A variety of methods will be employed, including reading and writing assignments, class discussion, student presentations, lecture, and online discussions.

X. METHODS OF ASSESSMENT:

Outcome 1:

1. Competency will be achieved by requiring the student to read short stories, poetry, novels, plays and essays. Students' ability to apply the elements of literature will be measured by classroom discussion, essay examinations, and critical essays.

Outcome 2:

1. Competency will be achieved by requiring the student to read short stories, poetry, novels, plays and essays. Students' ability to apply the elements of literature will be measured by classroom discussion, essay examinations, and critical essays.

Outcome 5:

1. Competency will be achieved by the same methods used to measure the first two competencies with the addition of one or more critical essays requiring the student to relate the events and themes of the literature in discussing a novel and another work.

Outcome 7:

1. Competency will be achieved by requiring interaction with readings and supplementary materials that go beyond the traditional canon to challenge students to explore the complete relationship between literature and the world's diverse cultures. Students' knowledge and comprehension of diverse cultures will be measured by classroom discussion, essay examinations, and critical essays.
