I. TITLE OF COURSE: MU2002- Music Literature I

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: Two credit hours Two credit hours of lecture and Zero credit hours of lab per week.

This course is an introduction to music from Classical Greece through the Baroque Era (800 B.C. 1750). Designed for the music majors transferring to four year institutions. A prerequisite to Music History courses.

For each unit of credit, a minimum of three hours per week with one of the hours for class and two hours for studying/preparation outside of class is expected.
